Gentlemen:

I hereby make application to be granted a parole from the further serving of my sentence.

I am now confined in the Utah County jail, having been sentenced to serve six months in said jail on a battery charge. I was arrested on the 2nd day of September, 1930, and did not seek bondsmen, and therefore have been confined in the county jail in Utah County on the above charge since the 2nd day of September, 1930, a period of more than three months.

I am a married man and have a family of a wife and two children, one of them age four years and the other age two weeks. I have no property of any kind whatsoever and my only income was from my wages earned as a common laborer. Since being confined in the County jail my family have had to depend upon support from the county funds and the aid of relatives and friends.

I recognize the mistake I made in my conduct and regret very much the same, and feel that I have been sufficiently punished and resolve to avoid all such conduct in the future.

I am 23 years of age and have lived all my life in Utah County, and this is the first time I was ever before any Court or ever been accused of the violation of any law. I think that I can find employment immediately upon being paroled and can thereby support my family and relieve the county of further burden for their support.

My wife and family need my assistance and I hereby petition your Honorable body to grant me a parole from further service in this case.

I thank you kindly for your favorable consideration of this petition.
