The affiants say that they are poor financially, and are having a very hard struggle to support their family, and that said Moroni Chatwin, if paroled would be of great assistance to them in helping to maintain the family, and that his help is greatly needed, and that they have work for him to do, and can keep him employed continuously if he is permitted to come home. Affiants further say because of the confinement of their son, they are suffering great mental distress, and that if he is paroled by this honorable board, they will keep said boy from bad company and keep him employed in useful work, and that they verily believe that to parole said boy would be for the boy's own good, and that he will not again get into trouble.

WHEREFORE affiants pray that this honorable board grant the application for parole of the said Moroni Chatwin.
