I personally appeared before the undersigned authority
C. A. Hain to me personally known and who first being duly
sworn depose and says:-

I am a practicing physician with office in the
Empire Building, Knoxville, Tenn., and have been actively
engaged in the practice of my profession in the City of
Knoxville, with the exception of service during the World
War as a military physician, for the past seventeen years.
I graduated from the Northwestern University at Chicago
in 1904 and also took a post graduate course at the New
York Polyclinic. I was Intern at the Knoxville General
Hospital after my graduation in 1904 and was a member
of the staff of the Knoxville General Hospital, and have
been with Interim as a member of the staff since
1904. During the World War I served as a medical officer,
being located at the U.S. School of Hygiene and Thology
at Chattanooga, Tenn.

In August, 1918, I was called in consultation by
Dr. J. B. Miller of Knoxville, Tennessee, and treated
Oscar R. Woods at the Stratford Hotel, in the City of
Knoxville, and administered to him a shot of 606 for an
old and neglected case of syphilis. I told Oscar R. Woods
about the treatment, and he was indifferent, at the time,
especially when I advised him that he should have con-
tinued treatment of 606, that I remembered distinctly of
remarking to Dr. J. B. Miller that Woods' apparent mental
condition, resulting from syphilis, that neglected cases of
syphilis often developed mental derangement or brain
syphilis in some form. I advised Woods that he was too
late in his treatment and that he should continue the 606
shots, but he never to my knowledge took any additional
treatment. It is my opinion that Oscar R. Woods' mind
was somewhat affected from the ravages of syphilis at
the time I treated him August 1918.

I am in no way related to the said Oscar R. Woods
and making this voluntary statement upon the request
of his brother who lives in Knoxville, in order that the
facts relative to my treatment of Woods might be known,
as I have no interest in the outcome of this matter.
