

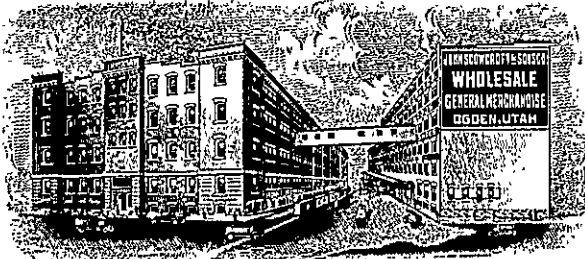

Dear Governor:

His case has been very unfortunate in many ways for him, and no doubt he was a victim of circumstances, as you probably already understand. However, Governor, I really believe that the punishment he has received up to date is more than sufficient to warrant his release. I am fully satisfied that if his case is considered favorably, he will conduct himself in such a way that will be a credit both to his family and friends, and to the Board of Pardons, should they grant his request. The ends of justice have no doubt been served, and I really believe that leniency should be extended to him.

Trusting you will give this matter your personal attention, and assuring you that your kind consideration will be very much appreciated by myself, as well as by many of Mr. Shaw's friends here in Ogden, as he is really needed at home to take care of his family, I remain,
