Each of the undersigned, having felt impelled to write your Board an individual and personal letter with respect to the case of George S. Shaw of this city, and whereas we realize that such individual and personal letters would consume an excess of the time of your Honorable board in the perusal and consideration of such letters, we have, therefore, decided to put our views before you collectively.

Mr. Shaw is well and personally known to us and we are familiar with his past life, habits and activities. We are, also, familiar with the case as it progressed in the court and, without any sense of criticism of such officials who had to do with the case, we feel a sense of the miscarriage of justice, as we are inclined to the belief that certain testimony introduced at the trial was given more weight than was deserved. We, therefore, ask the consideration of your Honorable board with a view of putting Mr. Shaw on parole and we shall each be very glad to counsel and do what we can to assist him.

We, also, have the assurance from the Cheesman Automobile Company that they will immediately upon his release put him back into his old position, Mr. Shaw having been with them a number of years and his services have been at all times satisfactory. The Cheesman Automobile Company, also, assure us that they will do everything necessary to have Mr. Shaw's ~~actions conform to conduct~~ upon which there can be no criticism.
