THE COURT: Have you anything further to say why the court should not pronounce judgment?

THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

THE COURT: The court will either sentence you now or give you a trial, whichever you want. If you want a little further time to think about it, you may do so. Have you anything further to say before the court pronounces sentence and judgment in this case?

THE DEFENDANT: No, sir.

THE COURT: Mr. King, have you anything--after further consultation do you have any further facts.

MR. KING: He is ready to proceed.

THE COURT: The court then will pronounce judgment upon your plea of guilty. The judgment of the court is that you be taken by the sheriff of this county to the state prison, and there confined for a term of not to exceed the maximum provided by law for the crime of grand larceny, and not less than the minimum term provided for that offense. The court would say to you that the length of time will have to be determined by the board of pardons and a great deal will depend on your conduct there. If you do the right thing, and your conduct is good, you will get out a great deal sooner than you would otherwise.
