

THE COURT: Perhaps we better have the Information read to the defendant, first.

(Information read; copy delivered to the defendant.)

THE COURT:

Q To the Information that has been read to you, Mr. Delano, what is your plea-- Guilty or Not Guilty?

MR. HEMPSTEAD: If the Court please, I did not know there were two counts in the Information. I thought it was just burglary in the second degree. He desires to plead guilty to burglary in the second degree but not guilty to the larceny. I understand Judge Rogers is willing to dismiss that or not ask for a plea on it.

MR. ROGERS: We move that the second count be dismissed, with the understanding that the defendant pleads guilty to the first charge.

Q To the charge of burglary in the second degree, as made in the Information, what is your plea, Guilty or Not Guilty?

A Guilty.

Q Are you ready for the sentence of the Court at this time?

A Yes sir.

THE COURT: Now I will hear from you, Mr. Hempstead.

HEMPSTEAD: This young man tells me, if the Court please, that he is twenty-five years of age; that he has been in the United States Navy for six years and was in the Navy during a portion of the World War; that he was given a furlough for four days, and-- I don't know the technical expression, but he stayed away longer than his furlough permitted-- absent without leave, I suppose.
