

DEFENDANT AGUILAR: Seventeen.

THE COURT: Thomas Olgin, is that your name?

DEFENDANT OLGIN: Yes.

THE COURT: You boys have been charged in this court with the crime of burglary in the Second degree. Now have you any money?

ONE OF DEFENDANTS: No, we have not.

THE COURT: Neither one of you have any money?

ALL DEFENDANTS: No, sir.

THE COURT: Do you want an attorney to represent you?

DEFENDANT MCCARTHY: I dont think it will do any good, sir, because they caught us with the goods.

THE COURT: You have the right to be represented by counsel; how do you feel about it? If you want an attorney the court will appoint one of these attorneys to represent you. What have you got to say about it?

DEFENDANT MCCARTHY: I think it would be the best.

THE COURT: Mr. Woodbury, will you go and consult with them about this case? The court will appoint you to represent them.

MR. C. T. WOODBURY: Yes, I will represent them your Honor.

(Thereupon Mr. Woodbury and the defendants withdrew from the court room for consultation)

AFTER WHICH they returned and further proceedings were had as follows:

THE COURT: The defendants are in court. Are you ready?

MR. WOODBURY: I have consulted with the defendants, and it appears that they have stated to the officers that they committed the offense with which they are charged. Practically all the property that was stolen was found in their possession at the time they were apprehended. They admit freely that they committed the offense. I advised the defendants that they are entitled, if they so desire, to a trial by jury, but they have said they do not care to have a trial; that they are guilty of the offense charged and are ready to plead guilty.
