
and condition of this applicant, both at present and also at the time of her arrest.

Please advise me whether or not this matter can be heard at the December meeting of the Board of Pardons, and I believe if your Secretary will inquire of the Weber County Sheriff, he will be informed by the Sheriff that this is a meritorious case.
