

THE COURT: Mr. Baxter, what is your plea?

DEFENDANT BAXTER: I plead guilty.

THE COURT: The plea of guilty may be entered in each case. Are you ready at this time to have judgment rendered and pronounced against you?

DEFENDANT BAXTER: Yes.

DEFENDANT ANDERSON: Yes.

THE COURT: I will say to you that you are entitled to have further time of two days before the pronouncing of judgment. Are you willing that the court should enter judgment this morning?

THE DEFENDANT ANDERSON: Yes.

DEFENDANT BAXTER: Yes.

THE COURT: The judgment of the court is that you be sentenced to an indeterminate term in the penitentiary as fixed for this crime, the minimum being one year and the maximum twenty years. Now, that is the end of the judgment and I would like to ask you a few questions. Under the statute as trial judge, I am required to recommend to the Board of Pardons what length of time you shall serve, whether it shall be one year or more, you understand?

DEFENDANT ANDERSON: Yes.

DEFENDANT BAXTER: Yes.

THE COURT: The ~~defendant~~ Board of Pardons has full power in the matter under our statute to say how long the indeterminate sentence shall be, whether one to twenty years, and may accept what I recommend as to the minimum sentence after talking with you. However, you may get more. Now I
