

THE COURT: And you, Mr. Moe?

DEFENDANT MOE: Yes.

THE COURT: Mr. Gordon, I believe I will ask you to make a statement as to the facts in this case. Just be seated, gentlemen. You make your recommendation and statement now, Mr. Gordon.

MR. GORDON: If your Honor please, in the case of State of Utah v. Chris Hammer and Pete Moe, this crime was committed at Wendover in Tooele County, and I think they went from there to Idaho Falls. One of them was discovered there, discovered by the officers, Mr. Hammer, and waived his preliminary hearing and was willing to take a sentence then, the same as he is now. I asked her to come to Tooele. She said she hadn't a dollar to pay her fare, nor buy a meal and for that reason she couldn't come. I will just ask to make my recommendation in writing to the Court afterwards -- I would rather, than at the present time.

THE COURT: What do you know about the offense itself, Mr. Gordon? What were the circumstances with reference to the offense?
