I would ~~xxx~~ be glad to have you investigate this case closely, for knowing this boy as I do there must have been some miscarriage of justice, then if you can see your way clear grant to him a pardon or a parole whichever may be proper.

Fred is rather vicious in appearance, which was brought about by being kicked by a mule when very young, several bones from his forehead and bridge of nose have been removed from time to time.
