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The Court---Let the plea of guilty be entered in each case. You are entitled to further time, if you wish it, at least two days, before the court pronounces judgment. Do you desire to take the time allowed by law, or do you wish to waive that time and have judgment entered now?

Mr. Allen---I think they want to be sentenced now.

The Court---Let them speak. The court wants to know from them. Do you wish to be sentenced now?

Defendant Meiers---Yes.

Defendant Page---Yes.

The Court---Both defendants answer in the affirmative. Then let the minutes show that each defendant waives time for the pronouncing of judgment.

Arthur Meiers and Oscar Page, you have heretofore been arraigned upon the information charging you with the crime of grand larceny, committed as stated a few moments ago, in substance, in this county and State, on the 24th day of January, 1924, by wilfully, unlawfully and feloniously and against the will and consent of Wilbur Hanck stealing, taking and carrying away from the person of said Wilbur Hanck \$14.00, lawful money of the United States of America, the same being then and there the personal property of said Hanck and in his possession. To the charge thus lodged against you and each of you, you have pleaded that you are guilty, and this is the time appointed for the pronouncing of sentence and judgment of the court. Have
