

A I desire twenty-four hours.

MR. ROGERS: I will state this, your Honor, that I have stated to Mr. Ross that the State would be willing to give Mr. Ross a stay of execution for the period of thirty days after sentence, in order that he might adjust his personal affairs. I understand that Mr. Ross is trying to make arrangements so that the surety company, which is on his official bond, will stand no loss, and that he is endeavoring to straighten up the accounts in the office of the State Land Commissioners.

I suggest, Mr. Ross, that you be sentenced at this time, and if that stay of execution meets with the approval of the Court, the State will agree that if Mr. Ross puts up a bond of \$1,000 by tomorrow at two o'clock, that the State will consent to a stay of execution for a period of thirty days. That was the understanding.

The Defendant: Of course, I would not know the exact proceeding.

MR. ROGERS: I will state that Mr. Ross has lived in Utah all his life. Haven't you?

A. Yes.

MR. ROGERS: And he has a large family, and he has acted in a very fair way about this matter, after the discovery of the shortage, and I think there is no danger of him not being here when he is wanted.

THE COURT: If the defendant will signify his willingness that he will waive time, the sentence of the Court can be imposed at this time; otherwise he is entitled to a little time.

A I am willing to waive any time under the conditions Mr. Rogers has mentioned.
