So he got tired of waiting in that particular place and started to walk from First South to Second South on about Fourth West, I think it was, and he met this countryman, and the countryman says, "I made a raise", and he had a bundle of ladies' clothes in his arms, and he gave part of it to this defendant. Now, technically, of course, he was guilty of receiving stolen property, but he didn't know what the value of those ladies' clothes were that he had received.

THE COURT: How soon was he arrested after that, and what became of the clothes?

MR. ALLEN: Ask him if he had the clothes in his possession when he was arrested?

THE DEFENDANT: I didn't have them in my possession.

THE COURT: What became of the clothes, ask him what he did with them.

THE DEFENDANT: The way that the articles were turned over to me I returned them back to the same party.

THE COURT: Do you wish to say anything, Mr. Hutchinson?

MR. HUTCHINSON: That is about his defense, but of course the State contends that he participated directly or indirectly in this particular burglary. The evidence also shows that he was guilty of receiving stolen property,
