Gentlemen:.

Whereas, one George Manousos is now in the State  
Penitentiary at Salt Lake City, Utah; and

Whereas, the said George Manousos was an honorable citizen  
prior to the date of the offense for which he is now incarcer-  
ated; and

Whereas, since that time he has shown that he is more than  
anxious to uphold the law and act as becomes an honorable  
citizen; and

Whereas, he the said George Manousos was a valiant soldier  
in our world war, and placed his life on the altar for the  
rights of America; and

Whereas, the differences have been settled between he and  
the man injured; and

Whereas, we feel that the judgement was right as touching  
acts of this kind, but feel that his past record both prior  
and after the act for which he was convicted justify leniency  
in his behalf; and

Whereas, T. J. Parmley, Superintendent of the Utah Fuel  
Company at Winter Quarters, Utah has agreed to have the said  
George Manousos paroled to him, and will give him employment  
and report to your Honorable Body any infraction of any rules  
(if any there be) that you have laid down for his guidance; and

Whereas, we feel that the ends of justice will have been fully  
met were he to be paroled to said T. J. Parmley.

Therefore, we the undersigned citizens of Carbon County, Utah  
are well acquainted with the said George Manousos, and petition  
your Honorable Board to parole said George Manousos to the  
custody of T. J. Parmley, Winter Quarters, Utah.
