

THE COURT: What is your plea to this information, guilty or not guilty?

THE COURT: In the case of the State of Utah v. Fred Williams, No. 6088. Mr. Fred Williams, step forward. Your name is Fred Williams?

DEFENDANT WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: There is an information against you. Mr. Williams, you will listen to the reading of it.

(Information read to defendant by clerk.)

THE COURT: Mr. Williams, the Court advises you that you can take time to plead if you wish to for the purpose of securing counsel.

DEFENDANT WILLIAMS: I would like to make a statement. This is the first trouble that I was ever in before.

THE COURT: I don't think you should do that yet, Mr. Williams, the Court does not know what your plea is going to be.

DEFENDANT WILLIAMS: I am quilty, Judge.

THE COURT: You want to waive time and plead at this time?
