Honorable Sir:

I received your letter of some few days ago informing me that you turned my application over to the Attorney General's office, and I received a reply to-day informing me that my application could not be heard until the six months had expired which would be in July, 1923.

The Government agent has called to interview me in regards to Returning to Greece if I would acknowledge that I was guilty they would return me immediately, if my case had been a Government case I would have been sentenced to one year and one day.

I now wish to return to Greece at the earliest date possible, before the summer months has past so I may seek employment and earn sufficient money to purchase clothing and necessities of life next winter, as conditions in Greece for employment in the winter time is not the best.

I am hoping you will file my application for a re-hearing before the Board of Pardons at the earliest date possible so I may get results and return to Greece soon as possible.

Hoping this will meet with your approval so I may receive consideration at once.

Thanking you for all past favors and hoping you will assist me in this matter, I am by this same mail writing the Attorney General a familiar letter.
