THE COURT: Where have you spent most of your time since then?

DEFENDANT RALPH: Well, spent some of it in the army and some down south.

THE COURT: How do you come to be a draftsman?

DEFENDANT RALPH: Well, sir, I went to school thru the army and I went to night school when I was working. I am not quite a draftsman, I have just had two years of it.

THE COURT: Did you work for any one as a draftsman?

DEFENDANT RALPH: No, sir, not yet.

THE COURT: You gentlemen understand that this court hasn't the power to fix the term of your imprisonment. That of course, will be determined by the Board of Pardons.

BOTH DEFENDANTS: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: It is the judgment of the court that you and each of you be confined in the State Penitentiary for an indeterminate term. The court, within the next thirty days, will make a recommendation to the Board of Pardons. You may be seated. You may go with the officer.
