At the last meeting of the Board of Pardons my application was continued until the September meeting. This continuance was induced, I believe, by the fact that there was a possibility that my return to the State of California might be requested by the California authorities as a parole violator from Folsom Prison.

Remembering your kindly and successful intercession in behalf of A. D. Gaines, also a parole violator from the same State, impells me to ask you if you will not also endeavor to secure for me the same leniency extended to him.

I was paroled by the State Board of Prison Directors to come to the State of Utah, and I have never left it. For the crime for which I am here I am being punished, which also constituted my violation of Parole.

I realize the utter futility of wrong doing - that it does not pay from any standpoint, and my one wish now is to be given the opportunity to make amends for the past in the only way possible - by so living the future that no act of mine will give cause for regret to those having aided, and trusted me.
