A I never thought about it at the time.

Q Well, of course there is only one thing to do in a case of this kind and that is to put you where you will have plenty of time to make up your mind that you will not do it any more. It is a distressing thing to have to send a young man like you to the State Prison; but there isn't anything else to do; and I don't believe in your case that I shall recommend very much leniency. I think what you need is time to fully consider the seriousness of this kind of thing and make up
