MR. I don't think they have any past record concerning this defendant, to the effect that he has ever been in any trouble. On the other hand, what evidence they have or what information they have is to the effect that he has been a hard-working man, for years.

QUESTIONS BY THE COURT:

Q Who took the jewelry from the person of the man who was struck?

A Well, by fear-- I am going to tell the truth and be honest-- by fear, when he hit this man and said if I did not take the things he would hit me, I took the watch.

Q What became of the watch? A. He pawned it.

Q Did you give it to him?

A Yes sir; I give it to him, and he pawned it.

Q When did you give it to him?

A Well, I give it to him that night.

Q How long after the man was struck? A. About ten minutes.

Q Where were you when you gave the watch to him?

A We was right by the Saltair Depot, just about at the Saltair Station.

Q You had walked some distance?

A Yes sir; we walked some distance.

Q Did you go with him to the pawnshop? A. Yes sir.

Q When was it pawned?

A I can't recall the date, Judge, that the watch was pawned;
