Gentlemen:

I had telephone communication this afternoon from a Mrs. Clark in Salt Lake City, who represented to me that she was the mother of George Clark, an applicant to your Board for leniency, stating that I had made no report of the sentence or judgment against Clark.

I have to say that one, George Clark, was informed against by the District Attorney of this District on May 23rd, 1923, for the crime of Burglary in the Second Degree, alleged to have been committed in Ogden City on May 18th, 1923, by then and there in the night time breaking and entering the dwelling house of A. J. McClelland, at #539 - West 24th Street in Ogden City, with intent to commit the crime of Larceny. Clark was arraigned on the same day, waived the statutory time for taking his plea, and thereupon he plead guilty to the charge contained in the information, and was by the court on said date, he having waived the time for judgment, adjudged to be imprisoned in the State Prison for not less than one, nor more than twenty years. I have no information whatever as to the circumstances under which the burglary was committed, and have no history of the case, and know nothing about Clark or his antecedents. The only information I have is what is contained in the information filed by the District Attorney.
