I have just recently lost a son here at Rawlins and I need this other son so much.

for support as I am estranged from my husband the Father of these boys and he has now his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife whom I do not feel has given the children quite a fair showing as is quite often the case. The Father I feel sure would sanction this although he might want him himself but I surely need him <sup>more</sup> than he does for I am 52 years old and am present working as a Chambermaid at the hotel here in Parco but
