Dear Sirs:

I have a letter from Albert C. Beaver, asking me to write to you with reference to an application pending before you either for parole or termination of sentence. Exactly which, I cannot make out. He informed me that this matter will be heard on the 20th day of this month.

Mr. Beaver, jointly with one John F. McVickers, was informed against by the District attorney of this Judicial District on June 24, 1924, charging these parties with grand larceny, to wit, for the stealing, on May 27, 1924, of a Studebaker Light Six automobile, belonging to one E. Rosenberg. These parties took the machine from this state into Nebraska, and were apprehended in Omaha, according to my information, while in the act of committing a burglary, or attempting to commit one, and were brought back to this state and then charged with the crime of grand larceny as above stated. They were arraigned on the 24th of June, 1924, and each pleaded guilty to the information, and they were adjudged by this court to be imprisoned in the State Prison for a term of not less than one nor more than ten years.

I don't think it proper that either of these parties should be released, either on parole or by termination of sentence, under the minimum term of the one year. And therefore I recommend that their applications, whatever they are, be denied.

I am enclosing Mr. Beaver's letter with this letter.

Both of these parties, as I am informed, are transients.
